



Charles Wesley wrote this hymn on the first anniversary of his conversion experience. In its original version it had eighteen stanzas. It is the first hymn in most Methodist hymnals.

Edward Perronet, for a time an associate of the Wesleys, later became a Congregational minister. Rippon altered Perronet's text and added several stanzas of his own.
